Leave certificates, transfer certificates, course completion certificates. Financial Accounting Module: Creates daily fee collection/ daily fees automatically, maintain cash and Payment vouchers, cash book, day book, general ledger, Bank Reconciliation Statement, Trial Balance and Income and Expenditure, Balance Sheet. Payroll Management Module: Maintain monthly net payable as per pay scale and grade pay for teaching and non teaching staff. The Pay sheet report for allowances and deduction norms is prepared and submitted to concerned authorities and government authorities for sanctioning. Students Attendance Module: Attendances of all students are tracked with specificity to various subjects and practicals. From this system attendance percentage class wise, subject wise and teacher wise are monitored for analysis. The students which shortfall of attendance are identified and notified. Profile of Employees: The personal information of teaching and nonteaching staff, joining date details, Promotion dates, qualification and experience details, Service record, applicable pay scales, extracurricular activities etc, are maintained in eformat.</p>

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

V.O. Chidambaram College is affiliated to Manonmaniam Sundaranar University and follows its prescribed curriculum. The college has been introduced new programmes based on the new trends. It has introduced 6 Value-Added Courses and 18 Certificate Courses. The College has grown to the extent of catering to the needs of 2668 students by offering 14 UG and 12 PG courses along with 6 M. Phil. and 10 Ph. D. Programmes. • The academic programmes of the institution is

complemented effectively by way of organizing numerous special lectures, invited talks by each department throughout the year in a way which will make the student proficient in correlating the academic content delivered in the class rooms with the inputs offered by industry experts. For achieving this end, an Annual Action Plan is prepared in the beginning of the year to serve the purpose. • The institution has put in place a strong internal evaluation system by way of Continuous Internal Assessment which often tests the comprehension of the students through conduct of examinations periodically as the lesson progresses. • Student Handbook & Academic Calendar is given to all the members of faculty and students in the beginning of the academic year. It comprises of college timing, class hours and library hours, details of teaching and non-teaching staff, facilities provided to the students, details about co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, rules and regulations and academic calendar mentioning day order, test dates and major activities planned for both the Odd and Even Semesters. • Subjects are allocated to the faculty based on their proficiency, experience and interest. • The Feedback is taken as the parameter for improving the teaching skills. This is done on a five point scale with a set of questions. Corrective measures are taken wherever necessary. The feedback is collected from the students on the syllabus coverage, curriculum delivery and teaching effectiveness. • Academic counseling is given to the students on need based manner. • Students are given assignments and seminars on the completion of every chapter to enhance their level of learning process as well as improving their writing skills. • Based on the intellectual requirements of the respective course, Hands on training is provided to the students. • Based on the University norms, Practical Examinations are conducted and the marks are awarded based on the spilt up given by the University. • Besides, the institution brings subject experts and guest faculty/ visiting faculty to give practical exposure to the students on the subject topics. • Faculty members attend Refresher Programmes such as FDPs in order to gain more expertise in their subjects. ICT enabled teaching methodology is implemented in order to ensure that the curriculum is delivered effectively. The institution is revamping the traditional way of teaching through Smart/Interactive Boards.

Feedback Obtained
<p>Feedback from Students, Teachers, Parents, Alumnae and Employers are received for all the programmes. The concerned departments will evaluate the feedback, based on the parameters and attributes specified. The analysis of the same is carried out on the Likert scale ignoring 'neutral'. The report of the same is generated by each department and is submitted to the Principal and IQAC. Upon discussion with the Management and Principal action will be initiated. An action taken report will be duly generated by the departments. The feedback process is carried out on an online basis with the regular format to update the level of satisfaction of stakeholders. The feedback is obtained for various aspects such as course delivery, Infrastructure, Learning resources, support services and general conveniences inside/ outside the campus. This process is done to measure/ enhance the quality. For example, feedback for courses by students, overall feedback by students, feedback from parents and public, employer's feedback and feedback from alumnae are received, analysed and action to be taken / taken reports are generated. Likert scale rating is used for analysing the feedback from students using a four point scale by eliminating the "neutral" option in the five point scale. Students Feedback Student's feedback is received for the course structure and satisfactory level of evaluation with regard to foundation level knowledge acquired, difficulty level of learning, applicability in daytoday life, availability of learning resources, research orientation, skill development, employability etc.</p>

Student's feedback is also received on all parameters such as Assessment on Teaching Learning, Availability of Infrastructure, Training programs conducted, Availability of Support facilities etc., Teachers Feedback Teacher's feedback are categorised as resident faculty and subject experts from other colleges. Resident faculty members are expected to submit the feedback in the prescribed format as and when directed by IQAC on various aspects of college functioning. Subject experts' feedback/suggestions are collected from the faculty members outside the college before/after the conduct of the Board of Studies meeting. The record of these and action taken are duly minuted by the Departments. Parents Feedback The feedback from Parents and Public are received on parameters concerning the complete functioning of the college including the overall support facilities such as ICT facilities, classroom facilities, Hostel facilities etc. Alumnae Feedback Students who had completed their degree programme and had left the institution, continuing their communication with the institution after their placement voluntarily submit their feedback in the format made available for them through emails/hardcopy. The alumnae also support for the student activities inside the campus towards their knowledge acquisition and training.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Our institution has developed a wellstructured mentormentee system. The mentor (Concerned staff) bridges the communication gap between parents and management by regularly updating the parents about the students' progress and updates from the college. (i) Focusing on the need of the statement: a) Personal counseling and Individual attention: The performance of the students in the internal examination is scrutinized to identify their strengths and weakness. Under achievers are given personal counseling by the mentors. Individual attention is given and the concepts are simplified, taught again in their regional language for their understanding. Examination blues are identified and mind relaxation techniques are suggested to overcome examination stress and fear. b) Special assistance to special challenged students: i) Fellow students are motivated to help them improve their academic performance. ii) Mentors help them in career guidance and placement opportunities also. iii) Team dynamics and similar cooperative efforts make them feel to be an integral part of the students community. (ii) Establishing consistent communication with parent and helps closely monitor the growth of student: The written feedback from the mentees and the structured form provided to the students given a very clear observation about the overall performance of the mentee to the mentor. a. The mentor after identifying each mentees' needs draw effective strategies for meeting the identified needs. b. If need arises our institution arranges for resources such as referrals of studentsparents, doctors, psychologists etc. c. Consistent and constant relationships helps to quickly identify and intervene on problems that arise. d. The mentors also encourage parents and other family members to support and involve into the mentoring process so that it would prove to be a holistic process in the development of each mentee. (iii) Mentors are responsible, hardworking, outgoing, friendly: i) The mentor not only sees that their ward is satisfied but also ensures that the mentoring program is focused on strengthening and deepening the relationship to best prepare them for college success. ii) By reviewing program performance on a regular basis staff members are able to evaluate the effectiveness of the program components and improve them if necessary. iii) Mentors in our institution help students with issues they face often helping students explore careers, find jobs and make a d. iv) The first generation students may not always be prepared to begin college and immediately reveal their vulnerabilities to the mentor. Thus their great challenge will be to know these vulnerabilities so that they are in a position to support student success. (iv) Role of the parents: i) Mentors always have a consistent contact with the parents of their mentees'. They contact them through phone, email and often ask them to meet them when the need arises. ii) Parents of mentees actively participate and are present during the mentor meetings. iii) They meet their child's mentor and set boundaries and expectation. Their role will always to support the mentor in their endeavor to help the mentees come out in flying colours and be and be a successful.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

I. Conducting CIE: Continuous Assessment of students forms an integral part of evaluation of students' academic performance. Our institution adopts conducting CIE as a part of sound educational strategy on a continuous basis throughout the year. II. Prefatory Phase: • The academic calendar is prepared containing

the examination schedules is disseminated to all the academic fraternity and to the students. • General timetable is drafted for Part I, Part II, Non Major Elective, Core and Allied papers and practical classes. • In order to adhere to the dates mentioned in the calendar, HODs meetings are conducted frequently by the principal to speed up the syllabus coverage. HOD's in turn, convene departmental meetings and motivate the faculty members to complete the syllabus within the stipulated time. • Students are intimated beforehand regarding the dates of the exams and revisions are also given by the concerned faculty. III. Implementation of CIE: • Question papers are prepared in advance, printed and stored confidentially and handed over to the examiner on the day of the examination. • Quiz, Assignments, Seminars, Library work also form a part of the assessment. • Students with genuine reasons alone are given retest in CIA. IV. Evaluation, Analysis and Progress: • Results are analyzed by the class counselors after every CIA exam. • To be keen on monitoring the performance of the students, examination reports are sent to parents. PTA are also conducted frequently. Parents/Guardians are advised to note the performance of their awards and take remedial measures if needed. • Slow learners are identified and given extra coaching with simplified courses materials and repeated demonstration in the laboratories which augment their academic performance. • Continuous assessment of regular practical work, maintenance of record notebooks and performance in model examination is the basis of Practical Internal Evaluation. • External examinations are conducted at the end of each semester. Questions are prepared by the affiliated university. Student has to score a minimum of 40 marks out of 75 and has to have 75 attendance. Students having arrears are permitted to write their papers both the semester examinations. • Supplementary examinations are held for the final year students, failing in any one of the semester theory papers relating to completion of his /her degree. • Revaluation is also permitted on payment of prescribed fee within a stipulated time.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Preparation of Academic Calendar: As a foresighted approach towards achieving the mission of the institution academic calendar are prepared to plan the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules. It enumerates the entire schedules of academic and nonacademic activities. Academic Calendars are drawn up for the entire year covering the odd and even semester. It is prepared by the Academic Calendar committee comprising the Principal, Director, IQAC coordinator and the office superintendent. The calendar also provides primary information, ethical codes and the general instruction of the institutions. It also focuses on: • The general Plan of the University. • It gives details of number of working days, dayorder, public holidays, examination schedule, academic activities of the college, cocurricular activities and extracurricular activities, list of the faculty and campus activities. • Information's and guidelines to students to access amenities. • Student responsibilities and rules and regulations. • Scholarship details, attendance details, certificate courses and evaluation process. • Strict Adherence to the time schedule stated in the calendar.

Adherence to the academic Calendar: • The College provides a copy of the academic calendar to all the students and all the state holders in the beginning of every academic year which would facilitate to plan their year and achieve worklife balance. A link of the same has also been uploaded in the website with the help of the QR code. • The Programmes of the departments are planned in accordance with the Calendar. In adherence to the academic calendar every department prepares a "Road Map" for the entire year to carry out its functions effectively. • The dates for various academic events are fixed in the calendar and strictly followed and executed. Adherence for conduct of Examination: a) Dates for the three CIA tests per semester are fixed in the academic calendar. The Internal tests are conducted in a centralized manner. b)

General timetable is drafted for Part I, Part II, Non Major Elective, Core and Allied Papers and Practical classes. c) Before finalizing the dates, it is ensured that there is sufficient time for syllabus coverage. d) Question Papers are collected from the respected faculty members on scheduled dates, printed and kept ready before the commencement of the internal examinations. e) Valuations of papers are carried out, the results intimated to the students, revaluation is done as per the request of the students and marks are uploaded in the mark register and university portals at the specified dates. Internal marks are also uploaded in the college website for accessibility to parents. f) The attendance in all the three CIA tests is compulsory. Updates' regarding individual examination marks and their attendance is conveyed to the parents by conducting periodical parent-teacher meeting. g) Retest for students are conducted in case of genuine reasons. h) Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners by providing them with necessary study materials.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

The maintenance of buildings, classrooms, laboratories, Hostels, Sports facilities, Solid and liquid waste management, civil work and other facilities in the campus are taken care of by the departments concerned. Adequate inhouse staff are employed to maintain hygiene and cleanliness in the campus. Furniture maintenance is carried out periodically using inhouse carpenters. Security staff are entrusted with the surveillance at the College gate and vehicle parking within the campus. Campus Surveillance is ensured using CCTV's and other security arrangements. Electrical Structures: The electrical supervising team consists of trained and authorized persons to take care of the power management system. They maintain all the electrical equipments like UPS, Generators, fans, lights and acoustics. The solar panels provide the energy requirements for physics laboratory and college office (both comprising around 10 of total power requirements). Solar panels are maintained regularly using the support staff. Separate registers are in use to record the utilization of electrical structures in various rooms. Problems regarding the working of gadgets like Microphone, fans, speakers, Laboratory devices, etc., are recorded

in a log book at principal's room for the necessary action by the electrical team. Laboratories: The devices and safety structures in the Laboratories are taken care of with trained personnel. Lab attendant sets up, calibrates, and performs minor maintenance on all the laboratory equipment's. Logs regarding the inventory of items, damaged and lost items are maintained by the attendants and are supervised by the faculty. Rain water tank is maintained on an annual basis with a check on leaks and debris. Fire extinguishers are established in laboratories and are maintained at regular intervals. Teaching aids: Teaching aids such as LCD Projectors, Laptops, Desktops, Printers, etc., are maintained by the system administrator and a periodic audit is conducted to keep the devices in proper condition. Library: Books found damaged are frequently checked and are condemned. Question banks are prepared using university exam questions and are kept as bound volumes for the use of students. Annual pest control measures are taken and books are preserved accordingly. Reprographic and printing facilities are available. Separate fire extinguishers are available for library. Garden: Garden is maintained by the gardener. Regular pruning and watering of trees, plants and potted plants are done by the gardener. Sports Facilities: The indoor stadium with floodlights is kept clean and the wooden floors are maintained as per the specifications. Another indoor multipurpose gymnasium has been constructed and maintained according to sports standards. Protective window coverings are used to block fading causing UV rays and excessive heat from sunlight. The high rise roof tops are cleaned with professional cleaning staff. Ground staff takes care of the play courts. Students Amenities Center: A separate amenities center for students has been established with internet access, printing and spiral binding facility.

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

A stratified student centered system is in practise in our college. To improve the quality of education several plans and policies are constantly executed. The quality initiative reforms in the college are related to the aspirations of the students. Due to the increase in number of students in the UG, PG and Research programmes, the college has a multilayered organisational structure to ease and stream line the routine administrative activities of the top level administrators including the Secretary and the Principal. Consequently the

organisational system was contemplated and recommended by the governing body as an effective mechanism to decentralise the administrative decisionmaking process. The Governing layers are as follows: The Board of Management is the top statutory decision - making body, wherein the members of the Board of Management house adequate representation. It chaired by the President followed by the Secretary. The Board of Management includes 3 members from the V. O. Chidambaram Educational Society and the Principal of the college. Senior most staff representatives from the college also is among the layered governing body. The college Superintendent and a University Representative is included in the Board. The Board of Management meets twice a year to decide over the important strategies of the college to monitor the progress of the college. The college has a Principal and an IQAC Coordinator to shoulder the administrative responsibilities entrusted by the Principal. The HODs play a pivotal role in the microlevel management of the departments. The faculty is the last but holds a crucial position in the structure of the organogram for they directly deal with the students and are responsible for the implementation of the decisions made at different levels. Academic Council The Principal heads the academic council and governs the academic functioning of the college. The College Academic Council comprises. The council meets periodically to suggest measures for improving the teaching, learning and evaluation standards. Further it is involved in planning and executing the academic activities. Participation of Teaching Faculty in the decision making bodies Teachers are given due opportunities to be part of the top administrative and academic bodies. The Principal constitutes different committees and teacher representatives are given due authority to participate and blend in governance. <p>Best Practices 1) Buvan Panchayat Portal - Asset Mapping Objectives: • Sensitizing the youth by involving them in participatory neighbourhood • To get a clear idea of the status of villages and the infrastructural diversity • To access different blocks and panchayats in each village. • For easy accessibility for the common public to different assets(PDS, religious place of worship, bustops, hospitals, water points, schools etc.,) Context: Villages are the backbones of each district and in turn each state. They contribute to the wellbeing of each district but unfortunately the latest technologies of today are not reaching the villages as compared to the town or a metropolitan city. The inventions of electronic devices and mobiles are not put to the fullest use most of the villages are not technosavvy. A proper road map or route map is not available in a city. Practice: To bridge the gap, we have undertaken ISRO, NRSA (Remote Sensing Agency) i.e., BPP -Asset Mapping, a project of NRSA. In this 8 blocks containing 372 villages in Thoothukudi District, was asset mapped . i.e., Various important landmarks namely 170 assets(electrical poles, schools, anganwadi, PDS, Tanks, Water facilities, hospitals, worship places etc. Mobile were mapped using Buvan portal app. 100 student volunteers, using two wheelers</p>
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for the whole of the district was carried out for a period of 3 months. These data was collected and was uploaded in Buvan panchayat portal website.

Significance of the project: • Public accessibility is possible. • Data generated could support government for further planning and development • Would also help in individual decision making.

2) Enhancing Communicative and Interpersonal Skills Objectives: • To address the major problems faced by first generation learners. • To modify the attitude and behavioral changes and make them self confident and to meet the challenges in today's scenario. • To improve the communicative skills of first generation learners • Conduct skill based programmes that would improve the interpersonal skills of the students to face the interviews successfully.

Context: Thoothukudi is located in the southern most part of Tamilnadu. The city also has a major occupation as fishing and salt pans. The intake of our college mostly belongs to first generation learners from these two backgrounds. The main challenge they face as they enter into college is the change of medium of instruction from their schooling which is mostly vernacular (Tamil). Most of them come from Govt. Schools where exposure to English is minimal. All programmes taught in English are difficult to follow and express.

Procedure: To improve their communication skills and to enhance their confidence soft skill and communication classes were conducted in association with BITSTEP, a communicative skill development agency. A total number of 748 students, attended the classes. The Modules of the classes concentrated on improving the learning, reading, writing skills of students, through audio and video, enacting through role plays, demonstrations. These skills enable the students to attend and face placement interviews in a very effective manner. Nearly 548 students were placed in 34 reputed organizations and institutions.
