Payroll Management Module: Maintain monthly net payable as per pay scale and grade pay for teaching and non teaching staff. Students Attendance Module: Attendances of all students are tracked with specificity to various subjects and practicals. CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

V.O. Chidambaram College is affiliated to Manonmaniam Sundaranar University and follows its prescribed curriculum. The college has been introduced new programmes based on the new trends. It has introduced 6 Value-Added Courses and 18 Certificate Courses. The College has grown to the extent of catering to the needs of 2668 students by offering 14 UG and 12 PG courses along with 6 M.Phil. and 10 Ph. D. Programmes. The academic programmes of the institution is complemented effectively by way of organizing numerous special lectures, invited talks by each department throughout the year in a way which will make the student proficient in correlating the academic content delivered in the class rooms with the inputs offered by industry experts. For achieving this end, an Annual Action Plan is prepared in the beginning of the year to serve the purpose. The institution has put in place a strong internal evaluation system by way of Continuous Internal Assessment which often tests the comprehension of the students through conduct of examinations periodically as the lesson progresses. Student Handbook & Academic Calendar is given to all the members of faculty and students in the beginning of the academic year. It comprises of college timing, class hours and library hours, details of teaching and non-teaching staff, facilities provided to the students, details about cocurricular and extra-curricular activities, rules and regulations and academic calendar mentioning day order, test dates and major activities planned

for both the Odd and Even Semesters. Subjects are allocated to the faculty based on their proficiency, experience and interest. The Feedback is taken as the parameter for improving the teaching skills. This is done on a five point scale with a set of questions. Corrective measures are taken wherever necessary. The feedback is collected from the students on the syllabus coverage, curriculum delivery and teaching effectiveness. Academic counseling is given to the students on need based manner. Students are given assignments and seminars on the completion of every chapter to enhance their level of learning process as well as improving their writing skills. Based on the intellectual requirements of the respective course, Hands on training is provided to the students. Based on the University norms, Practical Examinations are conducted and the marks are awarded based on the spilt up given by the University. Besides, the institution brings subject experts and guest faculty/visiting faculty to give practical exposure to the students on the subject topics. Faculty members attend Refresher Programmes such as FDPs in order to gain more expertise in their subjects. ICT enabled teaching methodology is implemented in order to ensure that the curriculum is delivered effectively. The institution is revamping the traditional way of teaching through Smart/Interactive Boards.

Feedback Obtained
<p>Feedback from Students, Teachers, Parents and Alumnae are received for all the programmes. The concerned departments will evaluate the feedback, based on the parameters and attributes specified. The analysis of the same is carried out on the Likert scale ignoring 'neutral'. The report of the same is generated by each department and is submitted to the Principal and IQAC. Upon discussion with the Management and Principal action will be initiated. An action taken report will be duly generated by the departments. The feedback process is carried out on an online basis with the regular format to update the level of satisfaction of stakeholders. The feedback is obtained for various aspects such as course delivery, Infrastructure, Learning resources, support services and general conveniences inside/ outside the campus. This process is done to measure/ enhance the quality. For example, feedback for courses by students, overall feedback by students, feedback from parents and public, employer's feedback and feedback from alumnae are received, analysed and action to be taken / taken reports are generated. Likert scale rating is used for analysing the feedback from students using a four point scale by eliminating the</p>

"neutral" option in the five point scale. Students Feedback Student's feedback is received for the course structure and satisfactory level of evaluation with regard to foundation level knowledge acquired, difficulty level of learning, applicability in daytoday life, availability of learning resources, research orientation, skill development, employability etc. Student's feedback is also received on all parameters such as Assessment on Teaching Learning, Availability of Infrastructure, Training programs conducted, Availability of Support facilities etc., Teachers Feedback Teacher's feedback are categorised as resident faculty and subject experts from other colleges. Resident faculty members are expected to submit the feedback in the prescribed format as and when directed by IQAC on various aspects of college functioning. Subject experts' feedback/suggestions are collected from the faculty members outside the college before/after the conduct of the Board of Studies meeting. The record of these and action taken are duly minuted by the Departments. 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

A well thought out mentor-mentee system has been established in our institution. The communication gap between parents and management by periodical updation about students' progress and updates from the college to the parents are bridged by the mentor (concerned staff). (i) Spotlighting on the need of the statement:

a) Personal solacing and individual consideration: scrutinisation of student's performance in the internal examination to recognize their potency and weak spot. Personal counseling by mentors is given to slackers. Individual consideration is given and the conceptions are simplified, educated again in their regional language for their better understanding. Our institution organizes for resources such as referrals of students, parents, doctors, psychologists etc if need arises. c. Reliable and stable relationships help to swiftly recognize and intercede on troubles that arise. d. Encouragement of parents and other family members to support and engage into the mentoring process so that it would prove to be a holistic process in the progression of each mentee by the mentors. (iii) Mentors are accountable, meticulous, sociable, welcoming: i) The mentor not only sees that their ward is contented but also guarantee that the mentoring program is focused on strengthening and intensifying the relationship to best practice them for college accomplishment. ii) By assessing program performance on a regular basis staff members are able to appraise the efficiency of the program components and improve them if needed. iii) Mentors in our institution help students with issues they face frequently and aid students search careers, find jobs and make a d. iv) The first generation students may not constantly be prepared to begin college and instantaneously disclose their vulnerabilities to the mentor. Therefore their great challenge will be to know these vulnerabilities so that they are in a position to sustain student success. (iv) Role of the parents: i) Mentors constantly have a regular contact with the parents of their mentees'. They contact them through phone, email and frequently ask them to meet them when the need arises. ii) Parents of mentees keenly partake and are there during the mentor meetings. iii) They meet their child's mentor and set restrictions and anticipation. Their responsibility will always to support the mentor in their venture to help the mentees flourish out trumpet and be victorious.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Continuous Assessment of students forms a vital component of assessing students' academic performance. Our institution implements conducting CIE as a part of sound educational stratagem on a continuous basis throughout the year.

II. Prefatory Phase: • Preparation of academic calendar containing the examination schedules is circulated to all the academic fraternity and to the students. • Drafting general timetable for Part I, Part II, Non Major Elective, Core and Allied papers and practical classes. • In order to stick to the dates stated in the calendar, HODs gathering are conducted often by the principal to speed up the syllabus coverage. HOD's in turn, convene departmental meetings and stimulate the faculty members to complete the syllabus within the specific time. • Intimation of students beforehand concerning the dates of the exams and revisions are also given by the concerned faculty. III. Execution of CIE: • Question papers are prepared in prior, printed and stored confidentially and handed over to the examiner on the examination day. • Quiz, Assignments, Seminars, Library work also form a part of the evaluation. • Students with valid reasons are given retest in CIA. IV. Evaluation, Analysis and Progress: • Results are examined by the class counselors after every CIA exam. • To be keen on observing the students' performance, examination reports are sent to parents. PTA are also conducted regularly. Parents/Guardians are advised to note the performance of their awards and take remedial actions if required. • Recognition of slow learners and given additional training with simplified courses materials and repetitive demonstration in the laboratories which enhance their academic performance. • Continuous appraisal of regular practical work, maintenance of record notebooks and performance in model examination is the basis of Practical Internal Evaluation. • Conduction of external examinations at the end of each semester. Preparation of questions by the affiliated university. Student has to secure a minimum of 40 marks out of 75 and has to have 75 attendance. Students with arrears are allowed to write their papers both the semester examinations. • Supplementary examinations are held for the final year students, failing in any one of the semester theory papers relating to completion of his /her degree. • Revaluation is also allowed on payment of prescribed fee within a specific time.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

As a forehanded approach towards accomplishing the mission of the institution academic calendar are primed to plan the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules. The complete schedules of academic and nonacademic activities are specified. The Academic Calendar committee comprising the Principal, Director, IQAC coordinator and the office superintendent organizes the academic calendar for the entire year covering the odd and even semesters. The calendar comprises the key information, ethical codes and the general instruction of the institution. It moreover focuses on: • The university general Plan • The particulars of number of working days, day order, public holidays, examination schedule, college academic activities, co-curricular and extracurricular activities, list of the faculty and campus activities are provided. • Information's and guiding principles to students to access amenities. • Student responsibilities and rules and regulations. • Particulars of Scholarship, attendance, certificate courses and evaluation process. • Strict Adherence to the time schedule affirmed in the calendar. Adherence to the academic Calendar: • In the beginning of every academic year, the academic calendar is provided to all the students and all the stakeholders in order to facilitate to plan their year and accomplish work life stability. With the help of QR code, a link of the same has also been uploaded in the website. • In accordance with the

calendar, the department programmes are intended. Every department prepares a "Road Map" for the complete year to carry out its task proficiently in adherence to the academic calendar. • The dates for various academic events are preset in the calendar and sternly followed and executed. Adherence for conduct of Examination: a) The three CIA test dates per semester are predetermined in the academic calendar. The Internal tests are conducted in a centralized mode. b) General timetable is drafted for Part I, Part II, Non Major Elective, Core and Allied Papers and Practical classes. c) It is ensured that there is ample time for syllabus coverage before finalizing the dates. d) From the respected faculty members the question papers are collected on planned dates, printed and kept ready before the internal examination commencement. e) Paper valuation are carried out, the results are intimated to the students, revaluation is done as per the appeal of the students and marks are uploaded in the mark register and university portals at the specified dates. Internal marks are also uploaded in the college website for ease of access to parents. f) The attendance is mandatory for all the three CIA tests. Updates' pertaining to individual examination marks and their attendance is conveyed to the parents by conducting periodical parents-teachers meeting. g) In case of legitimate reasons, retests are conducted for students. h) Slow learners are provided with essential study materials and remedial classes.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

The maintenance of buildings, classrooms, laboratories, Hostels, Sports facilities, Solid and liquid waste management, civil work and other facilities in the campus are taken care of by the departments concerned. Adequate inhouse staff are employed to maintain hygiene and cleanliness in the campus. Furniture maintenance is carried out periodically using inhouse carpenters. Security staff are entrusted with the surveillance at the College gate and vehicle parking within the campus. Campus Surveillance is ensured using CCTV's and other security arrangements. Electrical Structures: The electrical supervising team consists of trained and authorized persons to take care of the power management system. They maintain all the electrical equipments like UPS, Generators, fans, lights and acoustics. The solar panels provide the energy requirements for physics laboratory and college office (both comprising around 10 of total power requirements). Solar panels are maintained regularly using the support staff. Separate registers are in use to record the utilization of electrical structures in various rooms. Problems regarding the working of gadgets like Microphone, fans, speakers, Laboratory devices, etc., are recorded in a log book at principal's room for the necessary action by the electrical team. Laboratories: The devices and safety structures in the Laboratories are taken care of with trained personnel. Lab attendant sets up, calibrates, and performs minor maintenance on all the laboratory equipment's. Logs regarding the inventory of items, damaged and lost items are maintained by the attendants and are supervised by the faculty. Rain water tank is maintained on an annual basis with a check on leaks and debris. Fire extinguishers are established in

laboratories and are maintained at regular intervals. Teaching aids: Teaching aids such as LCD Projectors, Laptops, Desktops, Printers, etc., are maintained by the system administrator and a periodic audit is conducted to keep the devices in proper condition. Library: Books found damaged are frequently checked and are condemned. Question banks are prepared using university exam questions and are kept as bound volumes for the use of students. Annual pest control measures are taken and books are preserved accordingly. Reprographic and printing facilities are available. Separate fire extinguishers are available for library. Garden: Garden is maintained by the gardener. Regular pruning and watering of trees, plants and potted plants are done by the gardener. Sports Facilities: The indoor stadium with floodlights is kept clean and the wooden floors are maintained as per the specifications. Another indoor multipurpose gymnasium has been constructed and maintained according to sports standards. Protective window coverings are used to block fading causing UV rays and excessive heat from sunlight. The high rise roof tops are cleaned with professional cleaning staff. Ground staff takes care of the play courts. Students Amenities Center: A separate amenities center for students has been established with internet access, printing and spiral binding facility.

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

Our College administration is decentralized by delegating various responsibilities to the Principals, Heads of the Departments and to faculty. Periodical meetings of the constituted committees are held to plan, execute, monitor and evaluate for this academic year [2019-2020]. A benchmark is set for every activity in order to ensure quality administration. The role and function of the Staff [Academic] Council is closely monitored to assist them in their progress. The members of the teaching faculty participate at different decision-making levels. At the department level the Head of the Departments hold the responsibility of mobilizing the decisions taken by the Principal and the Staff Council. The members of the staff hold various administrative positions such as the Principal, Heads of various departments, Members of the Staff Council and as Members of the Management Committee. Add-On Courses, Value Added Courses, Skill-Based and Certificate Courses. This equips the students to improve their general competency skills. To propel the growth in Academics the College has initiated a Multi-Linguistic Centre to give a global exposure to the students. The Women Counselling Cell also offers employability Certificate Courses to improve the employability skills of the female students. Such courses work towards Women empowerment. The college is envisaged to mentor and monitor the methods of education offered to the student community.

Teaching and Learning

The College has an objective and effective system of student evaluation through which a meaningful teaching and learning is assured. The college enables teaching and learning through ICT provisions and well-equipped Labs. Fully automated library enables students to have greater learning experience aptly supported by inputs from teachers. Lecture method is widely used by the faculty in all departments along with assignment submission and seminar presentations through GOOGLE CLASSROOM and ONLINE MODE. Undergraduate students are given hands-on experience and are exposed to work culture and work ethics through internships. All Post graduate few undergraduates and M.Phil students undertake a project in one semester as part of their curriculum. In addition, case studies, simulation exercises and group discussions help the students to learn effectively. Smart classrooms and LCD are used for effective teaching and learning. We have Academic Counsellors, who cater to the needs of the slow learners and fast learners. Believing in Einstein's words, "Once you stop leaning, you start fading", we encourage our faculty to update themselves by attending Refresher Courses, MOOC courses, seminars, Webinars, Short-Term Courses, and FDPs. For our professor strive hard to emancipate the youth through education.

Examination and Evaluation

As per the university norms continuous internal assessment is done in a semester. An overall comprehensive development of the students is monitored through the three CIAS. The

college follows a centralized CIA schedule. Two out of the three best scores are considered along with seminar and assignment scores. Apart from the University CIA system, our college frames a valid assessment system for several ADD-ON courses and skill development courses to mould our student community other than academics. A centralized End Semester Examination is conducted by the University every semester. We have an Examination Wing at our college, which systematically plans and conducts the Semester Exams successfully. The Examination Wing consists of our senior faculty members who cater to needs of the students and help them clarify their doubts regarding Semester Exam Schedule, Subject Code, Arrears Exams and Supplementary Exams. The Controller of Examination at our college Mediates, facilitates and eases the barriers and challenges the students face in approaching the University Controller's Office. The Academic Counsellors also shoulder the above responsibility to help the student community. The University Results are analysed by the Academic Counsellors and then Parents Teacher's Meeting is organised regularly.

Research and Development

Research Development at V.O.Chidambaram College progresses under the able guidance of the Principal and the IQAC. The IQAC Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator explains the guidelines, rules and regulations for various matters related to research and consultancy. The IQAC supervises research work at Loyola and supports the research potential of the College with adequate infrastructure support. All the staff of the college are encouraged and their contribution in the form of publication of research articles are suitably acknowledged. Each and Every staff are encouraged to take up minor projects and major projects in consultation with our Principal and the IQAC. To enhance our Founder's aspirations on Research, Professors from various departments have been sanctioned Minor and Major Projects by the renewed funding agencies in India. One among them is that our institution has been chosen by UGC to serve as a national research

centre with a Grant of Rs 88,00,000/- on 04.12.2019 under the scheme for Trans-disciplinary Research for India's Developing Economy (STRIDE) scheme Component I, for the promotion of research in and around our town. To enhance research our college publishes a Multi disciplinary Annual Journal 'OUTREACH'.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

High quality library facilities are further equipped with the following software: VISUAL BASICS as front end and MYSQL as backend database tool. Our library is a fully automated library. This enables computerized transaction of books [Issue books]. All the Books are bar coded. Our fully automated library uses software to upload and upgrade various e-resources [books, Journals, and database]. It has also subscribed UGC List Programmed and INFLIPNET database package directly which provides access to thousands of full text peer reviewed journals and books. There 16 PC - self -service terminals. The library has a huge collection of 74000 books. It also maintains a good collection of CDs. The entire Library's routine is automated.

Human Resource Management

The college has principled views on appointment of staff, training and development, compensation and handling grievances. The Secretary and the Principal of the college provide leadership and an able administration to carryout various requirements of effective Human Resource Management. A fair, transparent and non corrupt recruitment and selection process is carried out by our management. The University Selection Committee in collaboration with the college secretary and the Principal conducts the recruitment process with an objective and transparent process, as and when vacancy arises.

V.O.Chidambaram College management strictly adheres to the spirit of teambuilding and collective decision-making.
